Over the past two years, CCAEJ has taken great pride in the development and expansion of its Environmental Justice Ambassador Program. This initiative is designed to educate local Since its inception in 2023, the program has successfully trained over 250 Environmental Justice Ambassadors across more than seven cohorts. The curriculum covers a range of topics, from foundational environmental justice education to urban gardening and civic engagement, ensuring participants gain a well-rounded understanding of the issues impacting their

communities.

As we begin 2025, we are excited to relaunch the program and welcome a new cohort of ambassadors. This year's program consists of a four-week series featuring interactive exercises, workshops, and guest presentations to enrich learning on this critical subject.



In Week One, we were honored to host our founder, Penny Newman, who provided a powerful recap of CCAEJ's history and the strength of our community-driven advocacy over the past 45 years. Week Two featured members from the Robert Redford Conservancy, who introduced the SoCal Earth Tool—a GIS-based resource that visually maps environmental justice disparities across the region.

A Blow To Public Health And Environmental Justice





CALIFORNIA'S RETREAT ON DIESEL REGULATIONS

A BLOW TO PUBLIC HEALTH AND ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE

The Center for Community Action and Environmental Justice (CCAEJ) is deeply concerned about the California Air Resources Board's (CARB) recent decision to withdraw critical regulations aimed at reducing diesel pollution from trucks and locomotives. This move threatens years of progress toward cleaner air and environmental justice, particularly for frontline communities in the Inland Empire.

"Plans to meet the PM2.5 and ozone standards can now be kissed goodbye, for now," said CCAEJ Executive Director Ana Gonzalez. "What a slap in the face to our community, especially those in the Inland Empire. This will now make it harder to meet public health protections on air quality. So disappointing!"

The decision is largely driven by the anticipated opposition from the incoming Trump administration, which has historically undermined strong environmental protections. Unfortunately, this shift will disproportionately harm communities already suffering from high diesel emissions, endangering the health of children, the elderly, and other vulnerable residents.

CCAEJ is calling on Governor Gavin Newsom, state legislators, and regulators to fight harder for these protections. "The health of millions, especially children and elderly residents in disproportionately affected neighborhoods, is at stake," Gonzalez emphasized.

Despite this setback, CCAEJ remains committed to mobilizing and advocating for environmental justice. We urge community members and allies to stand with us in demanding that these crucial regulations be reinstated. Together, we can push for a cleaner, healthier future for all Californians.

A Victory for Rialto:

Warehouse Project Denied, Moratorium Enacted



The Center for Community Action and Environmental Justice (CCAEJ) is celebrating a major win for Rialto residents! On January 28, the Rialto City Council took a decisive stand for community health by rejecting a proposed warehouse project near homes in North Rialto and enacting a 45-day moratorium on new warehouse developments.

Despite pressure to approve a flawed community benefit agreement, the council upheld an appeal against the warehouse project at Locust Ave and West Coast Boulevard, prioritizing

idents' concerns. This bold move signals a shift toward putting community well-bein

"The residents of Rialto can breathe a little better today!" said CCAEJ Executive Director Ana Gonzalez. "While this moratorium should have happened long ago, we're hopeful this marks the beginning of a new era where public health is a priority."

The emergency moratorium allows the city to reassess warehouse zoning, truck circulation, and compliance with policies like AB98. Most importantly, it creates an opportunity for meaningful community engagement in shaping responsible development. "There is so much damage control and reparations that need to be done," Gonzalez emphasized. "We hope the council truly listens to the community during these next 45 days to create policies that reflect residents' needs."

This victory underscores the power of community advocacy. CCAEJ remains committed to working with residents and officials to build a healthier, more just Rialto. Stay engaged—our collective voices are making a difference!

As the new presidential administration takes office, recent executive orders have rescinded critical federal guidelines, including protections for sensitive locations such as schools. These changes have raised concerns about the safety and well-being of immigrant students and families.

Facing the Threat of Wildfires:

A Call for Preparedness and Community Support

CLIMATE CHANGE IS REAL *Wildfires & Air Quality*

Your health and safety come first, especially during wildfire season. Stay prepared and learn how to protect yourself during hazardous air quality days.

Southern California is experiencing increasingly severe wildfire seasons, driven by the effects of climate change. Extreme shifts in weather patterns are creating dangerous conditions, making preparedness more critical than ever. In 2022 and 2023, high rainfall led to significant vegetation growth across the region. However, from May to December 2024, Southern California faced one of its driest periods in years, leaving that vegetation dried out and highly flammable. Strong windstorms have further escalated fire risk, creating the perfect conditions for devastating wildfires. As we navigate these challenges, it is essential that we come together as a community to support one another and take action to protect our health and safety.

Wildfires bring hazardous air quality and the potential for sudden evacuations, making preparation a necessity. Having an evacuation plan in place is crucial. Families should identify evacuation routes, locate nearby shelters, and stay informed about official evacuation orders. Protecting indoor air quality is equally important—setting air conditioning systems to recirculate air and keeping filters clean can reduce smoke exposure. Limiting indoor pollution by avoiding gas stoves, candles, and incense can also help maintain better air quality during wildfire events.

For those who must go outside during smoky conditions, wearing an N95 or P100 respirator mask is essential to minimize exposure. Physical activity should be limited, as strenuous exercise increases inhalation of harmful particles. Checking air quality maps regularly can help residents make informed decisions about outdoor activities and safety precautions.

Wildfires are a stark reminder of the need for proactive preparation and collective action. At CCAEJ, we are committed to advocating for environmental justice, disaster resilience, and community-led solutions. Together, we can build a safer, more sustainable future. What's Up in Perris?

Community Pushback at Perris City Council Meeting Yields Mixed Results





On January 19, CCAEJ joined **Perris Neighbors in Action** at the Perris City Council meeting to stand in solidarity against warehouse expansion in the city. The meeting focused on two key agenda items—**11C and 11D**—both of which were appeals for large-scale warehouse projects that had previously been denied by the Planning Commission.

In a positive outcome, **agenda item 11C**, a proposed **412,000-square-foot warehouse**, was indefinitely postponed. Notably, no representative for the project attended the meeting, signaling a potential roadblock for its development. However, **agenda item 11D**, a **498,000square-foot warehouse project**, was approved after the City Council voted to overturn the Planning Commission's decision. **Mayor Vargas, Councilmember Corona, and Councilmember Rabb** voted in favor of the project, while **Councilmembers Nava and Vallejo** opposed it.
